WEM ECONOMIC FORUM

Some of you may not have heard of the Wem Economic Forum before. It is a body made up of representatives from Councils (Wem Rural, Wem Town and Shropshire), local businesses and community groups. the primary aim is to strengthen the economic base of Wem Town and Wem Rural Parish.

In January WEF re-launched (with a new logo, thanks to a Parish resident) following commitments of funding from the Wem Rural and Wem Town Councils. The next meeting will be held on Thursday 8 March and will approve projects to work on for the year. Local Council Award Scheme

Wem Rural Parish has achieved the Foundation Level of the Local Council Award Scheme. During October 2017, ClIr Len Staines and the Parish Clerk, Carole Warner met with an Accreditation Board at Shirehall. The Panel's comments about the Council included: The Panel applaud you on a number of areas and was impressed by your high level of involvement in working with the community and other local authorities.

Planning Policies

We have reported previously that Shropshire Council are currently reviewing its Planning Policies. The Parish Council has followed the review and given its opinions at each stage of the process so far. The latest consultation closed on 22 December 2017.

The Parish Council reviewed the suggested policies, the results from the Housing Needs Survey and other responses from residents. On balance, the Parish Council supported the principle of development in Wem Rural Parish. The Parish Council requested the Parish be classed as a 'Community Cluster' comprising of Edstaston, Quina Brook, Northwood, Newtown, Tilley and Aston.

The consultation also asked for opinions on development in the market towns and employment land. The Parish Council supported residential development in Wem. Unfortunately, there is a misconception that Wem Industrial Estate is within the Town rather than the Rural Parish. The Parish Council believes the Estate has great potential to be developed and contribute to the required employment land.

Parish Council Budget 2018/19

This year, the Parish Council increased its Precept by £1,000 to £26,000. This increase will raise the cost to a Council Tax Band D payer to £39.07 per annum or 75p per week. This is an increase of £1.37 per annum. The increase in Precept will help fund the plan to refresh the Community Plan and additional hours worked by the Clerk.

The Parish Council continues to financially support local groups. If you belong to a group which Wem Rural residents attend, contact your local Councillor for details.

Community Plan Re-fresh

Back in March 2010, a group of dedicated residents got together and produced the parish Community Plan. The aim was to understand residents' views on local issues so that the Parish Council and other partners could serve the community better. Since the Plan was published in September 2013 the Parish Council has actioned as many of the issues raised as possible.

The Plan now needs up-dating. If you are interested in helping with this project please contact your local Councillor or the Parish Clerk.

Broadband Update

Some residents will be aware that Airband is installing a new broadband transmitter at the Oaklands, Edstaston and it will provide a large proportion of coverage in Wem Rural. Planning approval was granted earlier this year so works to install the transmitter will begin imminently, with an expected go live date in Spring 2018.

There are two further transmitters that provide some additional broadband coverage within the Parish, and these are also planned to go live in Spring 2018.

As works get underway, Airband will be able to provide a more accurate date for live coverage, and intend to provide Parish Council updates as and when the project progresses. Airband will also send out project newsletters and individual notifications for those that have registered interest by entering their postcode on the Airband website at <u>www.airband.co.uk</u>.

TRAFFIC UPDATE

Since the last newsletter, the Parish Council has been progressing, on behalf of residents, concerns about speeding traffic in the Parish, and in particular, Pepper Street and Shrewsbury Road.

The Parish Council requested traffic monitoring along Pepper Street and had to pay for this due to budgetary restrictions at Shropshire Council. The monitoring took place during November 2017 and included analysis of HGVs and non-HGVs. The results did not justify further action by Shropshire Council or the Police but will be a base line for any further analysis should there be any changes in circumstances. Traffic calming measures along Shrewsbury Road have also been discussed by Shropshire Council and the safer Roads Partnership (Police) and the concerns have been passed back to Shropshire Council. Whether action is taken depends on the ranking against other areas of concerns countywide and budgets.

On a positive note, the long awaited 20mph advisory signs have been installed at Newtown School. The Parish Council is wishing to work with the School and Newtown Community and Recreation Association to achieve practical measures to relieve the congestion at drop off and pick up times.

Wem Relief Road

Representatives of the Parish Council recently attended meetings with Rt Hon Owen Paterson MP, together with representatives of Shropshire Council and Wem Town Council. There is currently no national funding for a relief road but it was agreed to seek guidance and other funding to prepare a feasibility study. The Parish Council will continue to keep residents informed.

FOCUS ON: Tilley, Timber and Technology

The sleepy hamlet of Tilley has a closely guarded secret - its historic built heritage. In 2015, local residents George Nash and Alastair Reid made an application to run an archaeological project that would delve into the history of the building stock and its medieval timber-framing tradition. The Tilley Timber Project is funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and focused on accurately-dating thirty-five medieval and early post-medieval timber-famed buildings both within the village and the surrounding countryside (known in medieval times as the Tilley Township). This three-year fully-funded project has managed to successfully date nearly all of the timber -framed buildings within Tilley, along with isolated farmsteads. The key to the success of this project was the permission given by the home owners to creep and crawl through the numerous roof spaces and rooms looking for ideal timbers to sample. Supporting the fieldwork element of the project was a wealth of historic documentary evidence, in particular, a land ownership survey of 1561 and an estate map that dated to 1631

undertook all the sampling and laboratory analysis. It soon became apparent that previous estimates on the age of each building were grossly inaccurate and revealed much earlier dates than expected.

As part of our outreach programme local youth organisations became involved in several tick-box sheet surveys of each of the building. These tick-box surveys systematically recorded the main timberframed features of the building and provide an initial date estimate based on the stylistic features present. Completed tick-box sheets were later entered onto
