Hedges, Ditches and Trees!

Last year we reminded you about hedge cutting and ditch cleaning. It is that time of year again! It has been good to see Shropshire Council Drainage Team carrying out work to clear ditches but we know there is more to do. Landowners need to check the ditches too.

We didn't say anything about trees last year! We had some awful storms in Autumn 2021 and trees fell into roads. This is very dangerous and can disrupt travel. It is also very expensive to remove a fallen tree on the road in a hurry. Much better to check your trees now. Are any of your trees looking dangerous? Are they overhanging roads?

WRPC Budget 2023/24

Worried about rising energy bills? You are not alone!

You are not alone if the energy price cap increase announcement on 1 October has left you worried about paying your bills this winter.

Working together with local charities, Shropshire Council and key organisations across the county are supporting residents through these challenging times. In partnership with Marches Energy Agency, Shropshire Council's team, Keep Shropshire Warm, is offering free home MOTs to help people save money on their bills this winter.

As part of the energy MOT, one of the friendly Keep Shropshire Warm advisors will inspect your home for any 'major faults' and 'advisories', check your energy usage and offer solutions before the colder months arrive.

They will also fit free, low-cost energy saving measures and answer any questions you have – big or small. You will then receive a copy of your MOT with suggestions of what to do next. To book a free home energy MOT, call 0800 112 3743.


FURTHER PROGRESS

After all the planning and excitement of the Edstaston Village Hall relaunch party on Saturday 18th June there was still work to be done to get the hall, and particularly the outside space, ready to be fully used by the community.

On the first of July, after much raking and rolling, grass seed (supplied by Spunhill Ltd) was finally sown by willing volunteers....and then the great heat of the summer arrived! Through careful watering and daily monitoring the grass (and weeds!) began to grow until the weeds were actually sheltering the new grass from the fierce sun!

By the end of July, the “croquet lawn” (as it is now known) was ready for its first trim.

And look at it now... Huge thanks to all the Vernon family for their ongoing care with regular mowing and strimming. **We would like to recruit volunteers for a rota of grass mowing. If you are able to help out please contact any committee member.**



NEXT STEPS

Piles of planings have already been delivered to make the car park extension useable - this will be done as soon as volunteers are able to spare the time.

New PIR outside lights have now been installed by the excellent Hunter Lloyd Ltd - thanks to Charles Forrester for his very kind donation. A solar light has been hung on the gate which will hopefully illuminate the padlock on dark nights.

- Edstaston Village Hall has been chosen to be part of the next round of the Co-op Local Community Fund. The proceeds will fund new café tables and chairs suitable for indoor and outdoor use to replace the square heavy tables that have been used in the hall since the 1970s.

To help us earn the funding we need **YOUR** help. If you shop at the Co-op (not the Midcounties Co-op in Wem or Shawbury - these aren't part of the scheme), please choose Edstaston Village Hall as your local cause (from 24th October). - Members of the committee were invited to share our Edstaston Village Hall project at the Shropshire Village Halls Conference (held by Community Resource, a Shropshire charity committed to supporting Shropshire communities). Bev and Liz talked through our experiences renovating Edstaston Village Hall with the help of the community – from initial plans, securing funding, the build process and the big reveal (with some celebrity support!). There was a lot of praise and positive feedback and our story is going to be used as a successful case study for the charity's annual review.

Introducing Shropshire Councillor Peter Broomhall

My name is Cllr Peter Broomhall, I was elected in May 2021 as a Conservative Councillor to represent Wem Division which covers Wem, Wem Rural and Whixall. This is a two-member ward the other councillor being Edward Towers (Independent) who I work closely with on matters that involve the community.

Shropshire Council comprises of 74 Councillors 41 Conservatives 14 Lib Dems 10 Labour 4 Green 4 Independents and 1 Non-Affiliated Independent. The Council is run by the Cabinet which is made up of 9 Conservative Councillors one of whom is the leader the other eight members are appointed by the leader. The Cabinet is part of the council which is responsible for most day-to-day decisions.

When I was elected in the Conservative Manifesto it stated, if we were elected, we would put an extra £40 million in the highways budget over four years. There has been £62 million put into the budget and I think after 18 months we are seeing a vast improvement on our road networks around the county but still more improvements are needed.

The roads have had a lot of patching work done to them; this process is carried out before a road is surface dressed the following year.

The new recycling bins for plastics bottles and tins will be arriving in the next few weeks, if you have requested one you will receive one. Those people that have not gone online to request a bin can still do so by going to,

www.Shropshire.gov.uk/requestmixedrecyclingbin) or you can ring Shropshire council on 0345678900 or 03456789007.

There will be a second phase where residents who have missed requesting a bin can do so now because remember, you do not automatically get a new bin - if you have not requested one you will not receive one.

Edward and I fought very hard to bring The Shropshire Local Mobile Services (Blue Bus) to Wem. Originally, Wem was not allocated any slots for the Bus to come to Wem. After lobbying the officer in charge we had two slots over the summer very well attended. The next visit will be in the Wem Library on 8th December, where friendly advisors will be on hand to offer advice and support on how to access council services and support from other organisations. A Third Rare Moth in Wem Rural!

Previous issues of Rural Review have reported on Argent and Sable at Wem Moss, and Small Eggar in hedgerows. Now we can add the Clifden Nonpareil, AKA Blue Underwing, *Catocala fraxini*, which has turned up in a moth trap in Barkers Green. The photo shows the actual specimen, but when it is disturbed it reveals beautifully coloured blue on its hind wings – photo from a book, in this case it flew off before the hind wings could be photographed!



What makes it special is that it used to be a rare resident in the south of England until around 100 years ago, but seemed to become extinct. In view of this, the identification was checked and confirmed by Moth Recorders in Shropshire. One replied: "Clifden Nonpareil is undergoing an amazing expansion northwards from initial colonisation in Sussex and Dorset in about 2000. West Midlands Moths (westmidlandsmoths.co.uk) gives an idea of how it's heading north at the moment. The map only shows records up until 2020 but there's nothing so far in your part of the world."



Another Recorder reported for this year: "Although there are about half a dozen or so this year from South Shropshire, there aren't any recorded from this end of the County."

Readers may wish to speculate on the recent recovery and likely change of status from immigrant to resident of this lovely moth, but the likely explanation seems to be climate change. Keep reading Rural Review for future reports on the ups and downs of Moths!

WACA – Wem Area Climate Action

You may notice that we have dropped the last word – “Forum” – because we want to reinforce the notion of Action, rather than imply that we only have meetings. Yes, we do meet once a month, and it was at recent ones that we were thinking about what more we can do practically.

At the first meetings a few years ago a large group formed and met in Edinburgh House, and Wem Sports and Social Club, but which has reduced to a small number. As well as lockdown, another reason might be that the task of reducing global emissions is too big for Wem to achieve? Or do we feel that we have all got the message? Maybe, but surely there is something more we can all do?

So there are several projects under way, some of them outlined in a previous edition of Rural Review, now updated and covering three main areas:

Food: WACA have participated in Wem’s biannual markets, offering recipes, encouraging reducing meat and dairy consumption whilst at the same time supporting organic farming and climate-friendly farming practices. A long-term ambition is for WACA to work with local producers to set up a community farm shop in Wem.

Green Spaces: We have explored with Wem Town Council ways to develop green spaces, for example by reducing mowing in a few areas, and adopting an area in Barleyfields to establish a wildflower meadow.

Some members have received training from Shropshire Wildlife Trust to assess biodiversity in some areas around the town. A Parish Paths Partnership has been set up, and with the help of Shropshire Council’s Outdoor Partnership is active in clearing paths, and replacing stiles and kissing gates.

Built Environment. WACA is working with the Council and other organisations such as the Civic Society to encourage use of sustainable materials and energy conservation. Surveying of existing buildings continues with a view to recommending appropriate improved insulation, particularly within the Conservation Area.

In addition, WACA recently attended the Volunteer Evening at Wem Town Hall to encourage more participation. We are working with Zero Carbon Shropshire, seeking guidance on any other actions we can take, influencing local politicians, and on working towards acquiring Charity Status.

What Can You Do?

To carry out these very worthwhile local activities we would very much welcome more supporters. So please can you help to make a difference to strengthen our membership?
